CO. HAND CHRONOLOG!

On 21 Dec 1965 information was received (212-011Z CG FAFFac) regarding deployment of units to Republic of Vietnam. Administrative items included:

- a) Units will deploy at manning level.
- b) Personnel reaching age of 18 after 1 ky 1966 will not be included in overseas movements.
- c) If otherwise eligible, ergeants and above are considered career Marines, there being no consideration of EAS.
 - d) Enlisted personnel possessing Buide MAS will not be deployed to RVN.

Logistics items to accompany deploying units included the following:

- Class I: 30 days (15 days MCI, w/trickans; 15 days B rations)
- Class II: Initial T/E allowance and 30 days replacement type I items; 30 days individual chothing; 30 days M/O items; 30 days dry cell batteries; 60 days operating stocks.
- Class III: 2 days MD gas; 4 days diesel 30 days s scial oils, lubricants and packaged products.
- Class IV: 30 days field fortification material.
- Class V: 30 days.

Mestage received on 30 Dec 1965 (300232) stated that 1st FAG, 29 Palms, California was available to embark CONUS to deploy direct to Republic of Vietnam (RVN) to arrive not later than 28 Feb 1966. This is based on latest force requirements and GI massham receives a assification of the 1st FAG. One 28 class LSD required for trans-Pacific Revenuent.

On sailing, CHOP (Change Operational Control of units sailing direct to RVN to OPCON/ADCON of CG FMFPac. Units affected are 3rd 8" How and 1st 155mm Gums, based on message 312100% Dec65.

Dependants of deploying personnel were permitted to remain in government quarters contingent upon needs of the services. (032010Z Jan66)

ADAIN

Commercial transportation to San Diego via commercial busses was authorized. Plant account and garrison property was not authorized to leave MCB 29 Palms, and was turned in.

COMMAND CHIONOLOGY (con 1)

The following baggage was authorised to be taken:

Troop space carge: Of icers and SHCO-One Valpac and one footlocker;
Other enlisted-Field Transport Pack and one Seabag.
Hold baggage (marked as such): Officers and SHCO- ne footlocker; other
enlisted-One seabag.

Uniform for embarking and debarking was field transport pack, normal arms and equipment, helmet with cover green side out, jungle kit, pistol belt with holster or cartridge belt. Pistols will not be carried by individuals (032010Z Jan66).

The USS Ogden (LPD-5) was recommended by COM-HIR-AC for the lift of the last FAG to RVM (050529Z Jan66).

On 29 January 966, (290648Z Jan66) CG FIFFee advised that CG III MAF/NCC recommended that 1st FAG HqBtry not be deployed to RVN, but to Okinawa. The 3rd 8" Now and 1st 155mm Guns would be off-loaded in RVN, and Nq 1st FA G to Okinawa to assume res onsibility for TF-79/MAB. FIFFee planned that 1st FAG Nq would provide the numbers for the Prov MAB and Nq Co. (021021Z Feb66 FMFPes)

USS Ogden scheduled to load Class V supplies on 1-2 Feb at Seal Beach, California and return to San Diego, pier 6 to load FAG vehicles starting 3 Feb 1966. (101925Z Jan66) Actual loading of Ogden commenced 050900U Feb66 and secured 070100U Feb66. Ogden sailed 0810000U Feb66. Sierra message sent CG FATPac and info CG FATTps, CG 1st MarDivRear 081806Z Feb66.

Dear Celenel Hannah,

This is an attempt to inform you informly of what has happened to 1st FAG since leaving 29 Palms.

Before getting into details, I must say that the 1st FAG was probably one of the best prepared units to go into Viet Name. We were lacking to some degree in experience, but this was overshadowed by material readiness and morale. It is with a great deal of remerse that I must relate the following fate of 1st FAG.

The leading was done in and efficient manner and after replacing two of the three trucks that broke down on our trip to San Diego we were in good shape. The third truck was the metre van and, of course, there were no replacements at 29 Palms. So when we arrived in Hawaii, I purchased an engine and some canvas to replace some that was term by the wind on the trip to San Diego and by Navy in leading. Two days after departing Pearl, the engine was preperly installed and the canvas was put on.

The fate of the 1st FAG was settled long before I arrived in Pearl. It seems as though General Walt wanted it as a base defense force for Da Nang. However, since the Navy was pushing for the establishment of the 9th MAB and assests were stretched a long way the General decided to use FAG assests te build the 9th MAB. Realizing the battle was lest, I set about trying te maintain a cadre of FAG so it could be restablished at a later date. Of particular cencern to me were the supply records, RPS, Comtacs, S & C and the metro section. I made a strong bid to deploy the metro section, and to maintain a cadre to maintain the records. When I departed Pearl there was serious doubt as to whether a cadre would be maintained. The only person receptive to the idea was Colonel Dickenson in the G-3 Section. As a last resert I made a plea to maintain enough capability to properly document the disestablishment er reduction. About 3 days before arriving in Viet Nam I received a message to transfer the metro section personnel to the 3rd Division, but no mention was made of the equipment. In addition all of communication personnel were to be transferred immediately upon arrival at Okinawa. Included in these persennel was the entire section maintaining and acting as custedians of the RPS, Centac, and S & C. As you know I have more RPS than Ferce Treeps and I had to have some relief. Se an inquiry was address to FMFPAC and a request to retain Captain James as alternate custodian of the RPS. I received permission to retain Captain James but received ne word on metre gear.

We unloaded at Chu Lai first and everything went smeethly, except it was difficult to convince everyone of the sheer quantity of amme and bulk that I had.

Upon arriving at Da Nang the same reluctance greeted us as to sheer quanity. I might point out that I had taken the trouble to communicate to III MAF/NCC total cube, square, weight, of each class of supplies on board. I even quoted total pallets to show the amount of gear coming ashere at each place. Even so, 30 days supply of aume is a lot of same.

I sent a radio in on the first beat to go in. No one met us at either place to give any instructions. Major McDaniels had to hitch a ride about 4 miles to 3rd Bn 12th CP to get instructions. At Da Nang the S-4 12th MAR showed up shortly and I talked with him via the radio that I had sent in using the ships frequency. There first question was, "where is the metro gear"? It seems that they were down to less than 3 days operating stock and wanted all the gear. I teld them I had no authority to unlead it. So a flurry of phone calls were made to PAC and I was teld I would receive some kind of word as to disposition. I worked all night separating metro gear from rest of Headquarters Battery gear under the assumption that the word be affinitive. I waited to the last possible moment and having received no word from PAC I decided to unload it any way. The need for it was so great that I believed that I could justify my actions. So, three trucks with trailers were unloaded along with 17 pallets of operating stock.

My conversation with Colonel Calender confirmed the fact that he absolutely did not believe there was any place in Viet Nam for a Headquarter Battery FAG. Lieutenent Colonel Fritch, XO, felt the same way, as did the S-3 and FSCC Officer. They were all interested in the assests but not any centrel.

The 12th MAR has a shertage of 65 company grade efficers and I can understand Colonel Calender plight and his desire for personnel and equipment. He stated priority 02 requistion took at least 90 days to fill and often much longer. So justifiably he wanted no FAG as such-only assests.

For a battery to centrol 3 or 4 batteries, it is necessary to pull efficers and NCO's to establish the centrol headquarters. This compounded the shortages. What no one seemed to realize was that FAG is structured for the purpose of centroling up to 7 batteries or 7 battaliens. We would have fitted in perfectly.

Most forward observers teams are headed by NCO's. Out of 12 organic teams in 3/11 only 3 were headed by Lieutenents. Then, too, it was necessary to to create 3 additional teams for the mortar battery. One of these was headed by the battalian intelligence chief. So the need is there. We departed Da Nang on 5 March and two days later I received authority to unload the metre gear at Da Nang.

Upon arriving in Okinawa, it seemed that every person on the island was waiting for the FAG. They all wanted personnel and gear. I was besieged from every angle to release people and equipment. I had not received any word from FMFPAC on a cadre, or on the RPS, Comtac, and S & C.

My first step was at General Fields effice and when I explained my flight, thank goodness, he was receptive. Se in order to properly decument whatever was in stere I held on to people that had orders from FMFPAC to be transferred. I just didn't transfer them. If I had I couldn't have unleaded my trucks. In fact, I arrived on Tuesday about 0900, finished unleading and getting the gear eff the beach at 0500 the next merning. All of the efficers and men had orders to report to their new organizations by Thursday. A complete wipe out in less than two days.

FMFPAC came through the next day directing a cadre and CNO the next day en the RPS. FSR assumed ad cen and ep cen. Thank geedness they seemed te knew what they were deing. All Cl I, III, IV, and V was turned in. All operating stocks were turned in. All consumables that 9th MAB didn't want were turned in. I prepesed 1 efficer and 12 men to act as a cadre. All Cl II Type I items not need by MAB would be retained. All items turned in were preperly decumented and will be put en slit decuments and requistions made so when CMC directs restablishment it can be dene simply by drepping the cards in the hepper. This should be far enough along by the 16th to make the transfer. At that time all the transfers will be made. I'm slated as assistant G-3, Major Crosby as Headquarters Company Commanding Officer. All other officers and most of the NCO's will move into like billets. The communication personnel were transferred to Camp Butler, except one or two to 1st MAR DIV, one or two to SLF. The medical people to let MAR DIV, just as their orders read. This is a definite weakness. If I had gene in countrey all the medical people would have left me and joined the 1st MAR DIV. I had a long talk with Cmdr Henry 1st MAR DIV. He stated that BUPERS really deesn't have the picture yet! I would have been without medical people. This needs to be looked into.

I'm proud of this Group. We were ready to go and they didn't want us. This group was probably one of the finest group of gighting men assembled in recent years. I'm sure you will hear from many of them later en. One of the hardest jebs has been to explain why we weren't going "in Country". Of the more than 50 men who signed waivers on their eversess control dates 20 belong to Headquarters Battery.

Just to show what can be done, when Colonel Lamb arrived here, his orders were cancelled, even though he was supposed to go to Viet Nam and even though Colonel Dickenson had told him to be sure he wasn't short stopped here. It was just a simple matter of your orders are cancelled, here is a jeb-ge to work. Later on FMFPAC affirmed the cancellation. He did, however, talk his way into Viet Nam for one day and this did help. But he was not present to meed us and Captain Kelly might as well have stayed home. In addition Lieutenent Olsen orders were terminated when he arrived. Then when we arrived they terminated the termination so that the unit diary entries would be correct.

2. Commanding Officer's Narrative Summary of Significent Events.

- a. On 16 October 1966 the Headquarters Battery, 1st Field Artillery Group, 3rd Force Service Regiment then in cadre consisting of one officer and 14 enlisted USMC was redesignated as the 1st Field Artillery Group, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade and moved from Camp Hauge Okinawa to Camp Hansen, Okinawa. The cadre was commanded by 1stLt W.G. EVANS USMER. During the remainder of October the unit began requesting and recieving equipment and supplies. Personnel began arriving and on 28 October 1966, LtCol J.M. LANEY, JR., joined the unit and assumed command of the 1st Field Artillery Group. By 30 October 1966 the unit strength had risen to 16 officers and 90 enlisted USMC and 1 enlisted USM.
- b. During the month of November the unit began preparations for embarkation and continued training of personnel in anticipation of subrequent movement to South Vietnam. Personnel and equipment shortages gradually filled during the month and by 30 November 1966 the unit 3d a combat readiness status of C-2 personnel, C-3 equipment, C-2 training and C-3 supply. The emphasis for training was placed upon combat training for the individual Marine including crew served weapons familiarization firing, patroling, jungle warfare training, mine warfare/ booby traps and section training. The Metro Section attended a concenwrated three day school on the operation of the electronic metro set which was presented by the 1st Missle Battalion, 57th Artillery, USA. The unit's electronic metro set had not yet been received. A field exercise was conducted on 15-16 November 1966. On 21 November the unit began singing supplies at the port of embarkation, Naha, Okinawa. By 23 Mc Yeallor all personnel were embarked aboard the USS Terrell County (LST 1837) at Naha, Okinawa and the majority of equipment and supplies were traced. On 24 November 1966 the unit departed Okinawa enroute to South Manama. This deployment was part of a programmed build up of Marine Chara forces in Vietnam. The unit arrived off the coast of Vietner on 29 November, and disembarked at Chu Lai, South Vietnam on 30 November 1966. Upon arrival, the 1st Field Artillery Group reported OPCOM TO TORRESTANDING General III MAF, ADCON 1st Marine Division (Rein). ORGON was a system passed to the 1st Marine Division and then to Task Force State ANGON was concurrently passed to the 11th Marines.

- e. Logistics. Received Class II, Type I supplies and equipment from Headquarters Company, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade and Marine Corps Supply sources. Requisitioned anticipated Class II, Type II supplies and repair parts for organic equipment. Commencing about the first week in November, equipment and supplies began arriving at a rapid pace, with unit supply personnel concurrently packing, assemblying, banding and marking mount-out pallets and containers. By 19 November 1966 staging of supplies at Naha Port Okinawa began. On 22 November Class I, and IV supplies were staged. All mobile loaded personnel and equipment preceded to Naha Port and embarked aboard the LST 1157. The 1st Field Artillery Group completed loading supplies and equipment on 24 November 1966 and departed Okinawa for RVN.

Subj: Training Program

- 1. <u>Purpose</u>. To provide this unit with a training program designed to prepare the individual and the unit for immediate deployment and combat.
- 2. Scope. This order provides guidance for a four week training program. Details of training will be promulgated by weekly training schedules.
- 3. Policy. The conduct of training will be in accordance with policies outlined in this order.
- a. General. All training will be oriented toward the type of operations being used by Marine Corps forces in Vietnam and to support the mission of this unit. Fifty percent of all field training will be conducted during the hours of darkness. This training will include the following:
- (1) <u>Counterinsurgency Operations</u>. To be effective, counterinsurgency operations must include an understanding of the limitations placed upon military operations by the local populace. All marines must be thoroughly familiar with the political, economic, civil and psychological aspects of Vietnam.
- (2) Counterguerrilla Operations. These operations are military actions of the armed forces of an established government and its allies against guerrilla forces. Training is required in the tactics and techniques employed by artillery in support of counterguerrilla operations.
- (3) Anti-guerrilla Operations. These operations are concerned with protection of command posts against guerrilla forces. Training is required to insure that personnel are thoroughly trained in scouting and patrolling, local security, camouflage, blackout discipline, mines and booby traps and march security.

- (4) Civic Action Operations. Civic action is the program being used by marine units to gain the support and confidence of the local population of Vietnam. Included in this program is the improvement of health, education and welfare of the Vietnamese people. In return, we receive vital information concerning location, size, organization, etc., of the Viet Cong. This program is producing excellent results and all personnel will receive instruction on the civic action program.
- (5) Ambush and Counter-ambush. Ambush is one of the most effective offensive tactic employed by guerrilla forces. Concurrent training on ambush and counter-ambush will be conducted.
- (6) "Tactical Trends and Training Tips". These pamphlets are published under FMFPac Bulletin 1500 and contain information on lessons learned by marine units in combat in the Republic of Vietnam. These bulletins will be given widest possible dissemination both during regularly scheduled training and, as time permits, on field exercises.
- 4. Training Program. The training program will be progressive. The program will insure the highest level of knowledge and proficiency of the individual and sections, and a high level of combat readiness of the unit.
- a. Each individual will fire his weapon for familiar-ization and to obtain his combat sight setting.
- b. Each individual will be instructed in basic infantry tactics to include ambush, counter-ambush, scouting and patrolling. Emphasis will be placed on defense of position areas.
- c. Classes will be conducted on use of U. S. mines and booby traps as well as the enemy use of mines and booby traps as experienced in Vietnam.
- d. Instruction will be given on crew served weapons and all individuals will fire crew served weapons for familiar-ization,
- e. Instruction will be given, lectures and practical application, on field fortifications including wire obstacles.
- f. Section training will be conducted following the syllabus given in paragraph 3404 of FMFM 7-4.

- g. All personnel will be instructed in preventive measures against diseases and poisonous flora and fauna prevalent in Southeast Asia. Emphasis will be placed on field sanitation, personal hygiene, and proper care of the feet in a hot, humid climate.
- h. Unit training will be conducted in the field to include a CPX and field exercise. The field exercise will place emphasis on local security, day and night displacement, and use of aggressors.
- 5. <u>Safety</u>. Safety will be stressed at all times both in field training and garrison. Particular emphasis will be placed on motor vehicle operator safety and precautions applicable to individual and crew served weapons.
- a. General. Battery Commanders will insure that personnel are properly trained and/or licensed before being allowed to handle explosives or drive any vehicle.
- b. Officer in Charge of Firing. The officer in charge of firing for any exercise will insure that all provisions of Camp Butler Order P5100.6G (Range Regulations) are complied with. The Officer in charge of firing will appoint a range safety officer who will be familiar with, and carry out his duties as stated in Camp Butler Order P5100.6G.

6. Schools

- a. Officer and Staff NCO Schools A minimum of one hour of officer and staff NCO school will be conducted per week.
- b. NCO School. NCO school will be conducted at the battery level for a minimum of two hours per week.

7. Reports

- a. <u>Training Inspection Report</u>. The Group S-3 will select classes to be monitored on the weekly training schedule and keep the Group Commander informed on progress of training.
- b. Individual Training Records. Headquarters Battery Commander will maintain individual training records on all training accomplished, to include general military subjects, specialist training, MOS training, rifle/pistol qualification scores, swimming qualification, and gas mask size. These records will be kept current on a weekly basis.

2. Commander's Narrative Summary of Significant Events.

- a. The Headquarters First Field Artillery Group (1stFAG) arrived at Chu Lai on 30 November 1966 aboard the USS Terrell County (IST 1157) from Okinawa. On 1 December 1966 the 1st Field Artillery Group relieved the 11th Marines (Hear) in place and assumed tactical control of all of the US artillery units in the Chu Lai combat base. The 1st Field Artillery Group was placed under CPCON of Task Force XRay and ADCON of the 11th Marines, 1st Marine Division.
- b. During the month the major artillery effort continued to be directed at providing supporting fires for the defense of the Chu Lai TACR and support of infantry operations in and around the TACR. In addition supporting fires were provided for the 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion elements inserted in Viet Cong controlled territory, CIDG/Special Forces Camps, Government of Viet Nam Armed Forces Units (GVNAF), and units of the Republic of South Korea (ROKMC). Three search and destroy operations were conducted by the 5th and 7th Marines supported by units of the First Field Artillery Group, 11th Marines.
- c. Operation Sutter was a coordinated search and destroy operation conducted during the period 1-6 December 1966. 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines reinforced by fires from Battery "L", 4th Battalion, 11th Marines and the 1st Platoon, 3rd 155mm Gun Battery provided support for the operation from primary position areas within the TACR. By mutual agreement a small liaison group from the 7th Marine Regiment was co-located in the field with the 6th ARVM Regiment CF for Phase II of the operation. Its purpose was to effect the liaison and fire support coordination necessary between the two forces operating in contiguous areas, thereby relieving the committed USMC Battalion Commander of such responsibility.
- d. Operation Sierra was begun 12 December 1966, and has continued through the end of the reporting period. This is a search and destroy operation conducted by the 7th Marines in the Quang Ngai Province Mo Duc area in conjunction with the 2nd ARVM Division Forces. During the first three phases of the operation the 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines was in direct support and furnished a Battalion Command Group to control the fires of artillery supporting the operation. The 3rd Battalion artillery elements were Task Organized to support Operation Sierra in the following manner.

Battery "H" (-) was helilifted to the CIDG/Special Forces Camp at Minh Long (BS53435157) to support the early phases of the operation and again later to Mo Duc (BS72185384) where it was joined by the platoon of 107mm Howtars. Upon completion of the initial phases of the operation the 3rd Battalion Command Group released the Provisional 155mm Howitzer Battery from its OFCCM, gave control of the artillery support to Battery "H" (-) and returned to the Chu Lai TACR. The Platoon, Battery "A", 2nd Battalion, 94th Field Artillery which had displaced to an alternate position (BS636753) was also returned to control of its parent unit. Battery "H" (-) (Rein), 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines remained in direct support of 7th Marine elements as of 31 December 1966.

- c. <u>Intelligence</u>. Upon arrival at Chu Lai and commencement of operation, the intelligence office immediately established contact with the G-2 Section, Task Force May, and with the S-2 Sections of the 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines and the 4th Battalion, 11th Marines. Contacts were later established with the S-2 Sections of the 5th Marines and 7th Marines, and with 7th C.I.T. and 9th I.T.T.. Contact was also established with the Chu Lai Defense Command, and range cards were completed for CIDC Watch Towers #51 and #75. The bulk of intelligence processed by the 1st Field Artillery Group S-2 Section was obtained from the November 24 OP at Nui Tron. Highlights of the intelligence processed during the month are shown in the S-2 Journal Extracts in enclosure (1) through (6).
- d. Training. Due to the recent arrival of this Headquarters in Vietnam, all training for the month has been directed at the individual to further his knowledge as a combat Marine.

- e. Special Operations. Units of the First Field Artillery Group, 11th Harines participated in four operations during the month. These were:
- (1) Uperation Sutter, a coordinated search and destroy operation conducted by the 5th Marines in conjunction with elements of the 6th Regiment, 2nd ARVN Division during 1-2 December 1966. 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines, reinforced by fires from Battery "L", 4th Battalion, 11th Marines and the 1st Platoon, 3rd 155 Gum Battery Supported the operation from position within the TACAL. On 3 December 1966, Battery "L", 4th Battalion, 11th Marines was placed in direct support of the 5th Marines and continued to provide support from its primary position through 6 December 1966, when the operation was terminated.
- (2) Operation quang Tin #122, was a search and destroy operation conducted by the 2nd ARVN Division in quang Ngai Province vicinity of No Duc. On I December 1966, the First Provisional 155 Howitzer Battery (TD) displaced from its primary position area to coordinates (BS67616834) from where it provided first in general support of the operation through 2 December 1966 when it terminated.
- (3) Operation Sierra, is a several phased combined search and destroy operation conducted by the 7th Marines in conjunction with the 2nd ARVI Division which began on 12 December 1966, and is still underway. The 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines was in direct support of the initial phases of the operation during the period 12-19 December 1966, providing a Battalion Command Group to control the fixes of Battery "H", 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines and the First Provisional 155 Howitzer Battery (TD) which was placed under OPCOM of the 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines during that period. The First Provisional 155mm Howitzer Battery (TD) displaced from its primary position on 12 December 1960 to an alternate position area coordinates (BS617640) from where it supported the operation until 19 December 1966. Battery "H" (-) was heleborne to Minh Long coordinates (BS53435137) on 12 December 1966 from where it supported the operation through the morning of 19 December 1966. It was then further lifted to No Duc coordinates (BS72185384) at which location it was joined by a 2 M107mm Howtar Platoon of Mortar Battery, 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines. The Howter Platoon motor marched from its primary position within the MACR. On 19 December 1966 the 3rd Battalion Command Group and the First Provisional 155mm Howitzer Battery secured from Operation Sierra and returned to their primary position areas within the TFX TACR. Battery "fin (-) (Rein), 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines remained in direct support of the 7th Marine elements at No Duc until 26 December 1966 when it displaced 2 of its 105mm Howitzers and I 107mm Mowtar by helicopter to a position at Duc kho coordinates (BS81203867). Battery "h" (-) (Rein) continued to support Operation Sierra from its resation at No Duc and Duc Pho through the end of the reporting period. A plateon of Battery "A", 2nd Battalion, 94th Field Artillery was placed in teneral support of the 7th Marines, for Operation Sierra and was displaced

to an alternate position coordinates (BS636753). It remained in general support until 13 December 1966 when it was further returned to it's parent unit at coordinates (BS63018524) and assumed its primary mission. Complete details will be submitted by After Action Report upon termination of Operation Sierra.

- (4) Operation Cortez. This was a 5th Marines search and destroy operation which was supported by Battery "F" 2/11 at Tien Phuoc coordinates (BT100142) and Battery "L" 4/11 from its primary position area. The operation took place during the period 7-12 December 1966.
- f. Command and Control. The location of Command Posts and battery position areas are shown on the overlays attached on Tab (6) Appendix (B). For 1st Field artillery Groups Organization for Combat on 31 December 1966, see Tab (5), Appendix (B).
- g. Close Combat. During the period 1-31 December 1966, the Viet Cong continued their attempts to harrass, penetrate and destroy artillery positions and equipment as manifested by a series of probes and attacks by the Viet Cong against batteries and separate firing batteries comprising this organization. For further details relative to these attacks see enclosures (1) through (6).
- h. Logistics. Hormal logistic support continued for the Provisional 155 Howitzer (TD) Battery, 4th Battalion, 11th Marines at quang Ngai (B5608721), and Battery "F" (-), 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines at Tien Phuoc (BT106142). In order to support Operation Sierra, 500 rounds of 105mm ammunition was diverted from Tien Phuoc to Minh Long (BS534513) for Battery "H" (-), 3rd Battalion, 11th Marines. Upon displacement of Battery "H" (-) (Rein), 5rd Battalion, 11th Marines from Minh Long to Mo Duc and Duc Pho, the ammunition resupply was accomplished by staging Class V at the Provisional 155 Howitzer (TD) position at Quang Ngai and airlifting it from there to the positions at No Duc and Duc Pho. Under the present R&E program the following weapons were received. Two M109, 155mm Howitzers (SP) by the 4th Battalion, 11th Marines, and one M55 8" Howitzer (SP) by the 3rd 8" Howitzer Battery, 11th Marines. One M53, 155mm Gun (SP) under this program still remains at FLSG-B for repairs and final inspection.
- i. Acrial Observation. During the month of December 1966, the Acrial Observer Section, lat Field Artillery Group, flew 33 missions for a total of 63.1 hours in support of Task Force KRay (Chu Lai) TACR/RACR, Operations Sierra, Sutter and Cortez, and recommaissance team inserts. Aircraft support was provided by Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron 16 (0-10 Detachment) based at Da Wang and Marine Observation Squadron Six based at Chu Lai. The following is a recapitulation of missions flown.

- j. Civil Affairs/Civic Action. To initiate the 1st Field Artillery Group civic action, the Civic Action Officer attended the Civic Action Conference at Task Force May on 29 December 1966. MEDCAF supplies were not available upon arrival of 1st Field Artillery Group at Chu Lai; however, the Executive Officer of Readquarters Battery became acquainted with the Hamlet Chief in Long Phu (20) earlier in the month so that liaison would be established by the time MEDCAF supplies became available. With the information supplied at the Task Force May conference, the 1st Field Artillery Group is now prepared to conduct a civic action program in its assigned area, which includes Long Phu (1) at coordinates (\$T510040), and Long Phu (2) at coordinates (\$T510030).
